Blackrock had the first attack, but an over occurred. Back came Carrigtwohill, only for Matthew Murphy to clear and send up-field, where Eudie Coughlan sent wide by inches. Patrick Ahern and Paddy Delea were pressing hard on the Carrigtwohill defence, which held up well. Eventually Paddy Delea sent along a great ball which was handled smartly, and finished to the net by Michael Leahy. Following a brief attacking spell by Carrigtwohill, Paddy Delea raced along the wing and scored a great point. Shortly after, John Quirke also scored a point. Michael Ahern was unlucky not to score a goal on the stroke of half time, where Blackrock led 1-2 to nil.

Carrigtwohill opened the second half with a great goal. Back came Blackrock with several attempts for goal, but the Carrigtwohill custodian made a series of fantastic saves. On a breakaway, Carrigtwohill pounced for a point. Denis Coughlan then was injured, and his place was taken by Frank O'Donoghue. Blackrock now kept up the pressure and Michael Murphy scored a goal and a point in quick succession. Now playing with great confidence, T.Tracey, Peter O'Grady and Paddy Delea were all having a sound game, and Michael Ahern finished off a great display, with a late goal.

Heavy rain marred the occasion. Straight from the throw in, Paddy Ahern sent over a point, to be followed shortly after by a second point from Michael Leahy. Keeping up the pressure, Michael Ahern came close to scoring a goal, but Blackrock won a free, which Jim Hurley pointed. Éire Óg then got on top, but found Edward O'Connell and custodian John Coughlan in top form, as they repulsed each attack. Eudie Coughlan then made a clearance to Michael Leahy, who quickly found the net, for a great goal. Éire Óg then fought back, but the Blackrock defence, where John Coughlan was sound, kept them at bay. Close to half time, Blackrock won a seventy, where Jim Hurley pointed, leaving the Rockies 1-4 to nil in front at the break. On the resumption, Blackrock's forwards tried hard for another goal, but Éire Óg managed to hold out. Then Blackrock get a seventy, and once again, Jim Hurley pointed. Éire Óg then had hard luck, when a promising move was again thwarted by John Coughlan for a

seventy, which they sent wide. Blackrock then returned to the attack, and Paddy Delea added two points. The play then was in the Blackrock territory for a few minutes, when Éire Óg eventually scored a goal. Inspired by this they kept up the pressure, but Eudie Coughlan and Jim Hurley made some timely clearances. A scuffle began then between some players, then some spectators joined in. The referee and a guard soon calmed down the situation, and play resumed. Following a great attack by Éire Óg, William O'Connell cleared to Paddy Ahern. With incredible speed and skill, he raced through the Éire Óg defence, hopping the leather on his hurley, before shooting an unstoppable shot to the net, leaving everyone in no doubt, Blackrock were back in the county final. Final September 14, 1930 Cork Athletic Grounds
Blackrock 3-8 Glen Rovers 1-3

Cork Examiner report:- On a perfectly fine day, with a firm sod, the county final got underway. Glen Rovers opened impressively with a rapid entry into the Rockies lines, where the ball went out. From the delivery, Blackrock challenged at the neutral mark, where Jim Hurley was getting a pretty tough time, and the Glen Rovers again laid siege to the Rockies net, but Sheehan's rather smart effort failed. Blackrock carried away on the resumption, and after a great dual, Paddy Aherne had the first score, a goal. Glen Rovers were next to test for Edward "Marie" O'Connell to clear to the wing. Glen had slightly the better of the exchanges, but Paddy Delea getting possession, Blackrock reached the other end, where things looked dangerous for the Glen lads, until D.Daly effected an opportune clearance to midfield.

Some mis-stroking by the Glen and the over running the ball at periods lost them valuable opportunities, but despite these drawbacks, they succeeded in capturing Blackrock's territory, and with success, P.O'Connell clearing the crossbar for a neatly shot point. The Glen were now sticking into their rivals in the most courageous manner, Jim Hurley, Peter O'Grady and Matthew Murphy coming in for a share of their robust tactics. Paddy Delea sent the Rockies moving, but Dorgan proved a tough obstacle and play was taken beyond the centre of the field, after which Paddy Aherne enabled Blackrock to re-establish their position, and Peter O'Grady to put up a point. Blackrock again took the offensive, for Fox Collins, playing splendidly, to clear the Glen's stronghold. Patrick O'Donoghue was responsible for another Blackrock movement, and in the thick of the struggle, Glen Rovers got a free, which saw them reach the Blackrock end, where they were awarded a free, without success. John Coughlan had a big hand in the next exchange for the opposition to come out best but to be beaten practically on the goal line. Renewing the attack, Glen sent wide. Willie Donnelly, George Garrett and the Aherne brothers having resisted the operations of Dorgan, Daly and Lee, the Glen's posts looked shaky, but were strengthened by a clever defence at the expense of a seventy, taken by Jim Hurley, who added a point. This brought a strong reply from the Glen lads, who had their chance, but it was not availed of, J.Leahy shooting wide. They came along again, but could not do better than an over. Rockies had the next challenge for the Glen's custodian to pull off a magnificent save. Pressing shortly after a couple further exchanges, Paddy Aherne raised the point flag, after which the Glen received a good opening, but it was very badly thrown away. The next phase of the game saw Eudie Coughlan stubbornly tackled, and the Glen taking charge the forward line shot wide. After a hard run of ill luck, C.Sheehan raised a point, followed by a wide by the same side, and soon after the short whistle went, Blackrock 1-3 Glen Rovers 0-2. Willie Donnelly opened well for Blackrock, and the movement was spiritedly supported, but the Glen backs responded to the challenge with

grim determination. In the course of the tussle, one of the Glen side met with an accident, and on resuming, the Glen covered ground with a wide by Daly. After Lee, Sheehan, Collins and Hyland had given a fine display, P.O'Connell forced another Glen offensive, out of which they secured a seventy. It was taken by Hyland, but nothing resulted. Paddy Delea put Blackrock in possession, following the delivery, Willie Donnelly shot a well centered ball, but his stroke was not improved upon, and the Glen side forced the pace. They had however, to concede ground. Michael Aherne passed to John Quirke, who rather badly muffed what was an open goal. Blackrock set up another attack which brought them a point, for which Matthew Murphy was responsible. Continuing the contest, a seventy went to the Glen. It was entrusted to Lee, who sent all the distance for a point. Then came some exceedingly expensive offensives by Blackrock, who were now playing up to their familiarly brilliant standard. It was the turning point in the fortunes of the game, and it was initiated by the Aherne brothers, who between them pulled off a goal. It was a neat passage from Michael to Paddy Aherne, the latter netting. In quick succession they supplemented with more than a brace of points. It was a bad shock for the Glen Rovers, who moved up, only to be sent back by Edward O'Connell. Glen's recovery took the form of two successive visits to Blackrock's ground, with nothing better than a wide each time. A goal by Deasy looked promising, but it was clear the Glen boys could not pull down the arrears. A point by Michael Leahy, and then a goal by him also, left but one team in the tussle, and there the full-time whistle sounded.

great account of themselves in the first half. A free by Eudie Coughlan was missed, before the Barrs missed a few chances with wides. They were now settling to the task, and only for an alert John Coughlan in goal making a number of fine saves, and Edward O'Connell figuring well in defence, Blackrock could have been in trouble. On a breakaway, Denis Coughlan opened the scoring with a point. George Garrett was now asserting himself in midfield. A free by Eudie Coughlan went to Michael Aherne, who put up a sound goal. Then Eudie Coughlan quickly followed with a point. Blackrock now had command of the game, and shortly before the break, Michael Aherne placed Denis Coughlan for a great goal, which saw the Rockies leading 2-2 to nil at half time. St.Finbarrs on resuming, tried hard for a score, but found Edward O'Connell in imperious form, as he denied them time and again. **Final December 13, 1931 Cork Athletic Grounds
Blackrock 2-4 Éire Óg 0-3**

Examiner report:- The support given to the county hurling final was reflected in an attendance so large as to constitute a very generous tribute to the reputation of both teams. There was a strong following from mid-Cork with the Éire Óg fifteen, while the Blackrock side commanded a liberal share of patronage from the city admirers. The weather was fairly favorable, but the pitch was in parts heavy and sticky, and on the run of the play the conditions seemed to lean towards the Rockies, who hit out with much power and appeared faster on the ball than their rivals, who pressed very strenuously, particularly towards the finish of the first half, when but one point was the dividing margin. On the resumption, Éire Óg did not stay so well as their opponents, whom they challenged repeatedly without success. In most of their offensives the mid-Cork men were not too adequately served by their forwards, but their defensive operations were highly praiseworthy. They fought as hard as any team could be expected to battle against apparent odds, but had to concede the honors to the better side. Two mid-Cork players received injuries, the result of pure accident, but they remained on to the finish. Blackrock's victory was apparently most popular, as was evidenced when the cup was presented to Eudie Coughlan on behalf of Blackrock. The Cork Volunteer Pipers Band was in attendance. Amongst the spectators was Mr.De Valera, who occupied a seat in the stand.

The match was started under the referee-ship of Mr.W.Gleeson of Limerick. Éire Óg opened impressively with a smart attack which Bernie O'Flynn finished with the first honors. The point was raised less than a minute from the start and the mid-Cork crowd cheered for all they were worth. From the delivery a fierce tussle was waged at the neutral flag where Blackrock pressed firmly. A clearance followed some brisk passages and Eudie Coughlan getting possession far out sent a hard flying ball all the way through the uprights. An over followed at the Éire Óg end after which the Rockies again took the measure of the defence. The attack was frustrated at the cost of a seventy which produced some great play inside Éire Óg's lines, the ball eventually going wide. Blackrock forced a further seventy which proved unavailing, and Éire Óg cleared their territory with the aid of clever work. Éire Óg were now feeling the pinch of the hard pressure from the opposition and further seventies came Blackrock's way. They were not handled to the best advantage, but finally Eudie Coughlan placed a neat centre and Paddy Delea swinging on to the ball put up the major flag. It was evident now that the heavy

ground was telling against the activities of both sides, but the extra demands made on the physical resources of the teams were quite equal to the occasion and the game proceeded with undiminished vigor. Dermot Murphy and Matt Murphy opened up a movement for Éire Óg and soon the Blackrock defence was in trouble. A shot to the side line brought relief, but Éire Óg challenged in great strength from the ensuing shot and just missed by inches. Blackrock next swept along to the other end for O'Donovan to save his net in fine style. Dinny Barry-Murphy, the Éire Óg captain, received good support from Matt Murphy, in the next passage, and Bernie O'Flynn had a point up for the mid-Cork men. Jim O'Regan had, in the meanwhile, been doing wonderfully fine work for Éire Óg each time their lines were assailed. A dangerous shot from Eudie Coughlan, who was here there and everywhere, brought his forwards into action, and a menacing situation was averted by a seventy. The shot fell short and the rush on goal was held up by O'Donovan, who effected a splendid clearance, but Edward O'Connell proved himself a tough obstacle on this as well as previous attacks. Paddy Delea, Jim O'Regan, Willie Donnelly, Peter O'Grady and George Garrett, continued to figure prominently in the passages. Éire Óg pressed to a seventy taken by Horgan and nicely placed. It was worked through for a point. Keane having checked a hard shot from Paddy Delea. Blackrock still maintained their offensive, the ball going out from Michael Aherne. Patrick O'Donoghue sent along a promising shot which was countered and Éire Óg went on for a score. John Coughlan just saved his net at the expense of a seventy. The seventy was beaten off by a herculean defence. In the next passage, Michael Aherne lost his feet while in possession, and the ball was at once whipped away by Jim O'Regan. Michael Aherne had an opening a couple of minutes later, and it was lucky for the opposing side that his effort did not materialize. After further duels fought with indomitable determination, Michael Leahy, who was unsparing of his efforts for Blackrock, had the hardest of luck in not penetrating the mid-Cork net. At this stage Jim O'Regan was hurt and play was suspended. It appeared to have been a hard knock, but he continued the game, to the plaudits of his mid-Cork admirers. A close and exciting half hour closed the score, Blackrock 1-1 Éire Óg 0-3.

The second half opened with Blackrock holding a point lead. The first offensive came from Éire Óg, who took a big shake out of the Rockies defence. The attack was diverted by Eudie Coughlan who sent to the wing. From here Éire Óg got on the move again to pull off a seventy. Horgan, who took the seventy, placed short and the Rockies backs were subjected to a hard grueling. Éire Óg lost a chance and another seventy having to be conceded by Blackrock, the mid-Cork team had further ill luck for a register, but they were up against a tough defence, in which Edward O'Connell gained much distinction. Blackrock resumed their pressing tactics for Jim O'Regan to clear halfway. A free to Blackrock taken by Eudie Coughlan saw the opposing side successful in a great defence, in the course of which Dinny Barry-Murphy sustained an accident. It occurred through the hurley of a Blackrock player slipping through his hands. The game young captain was again on his feet, and the game, in which there were some thrilling moments, was continued, and with Dinny Barry-Murphy narrowly missing a score at the Blackrock end. A free to Blackrock marked the next exchange, and after a clever defence, Michael Aherne pointed. Two frees to Blackrock having gone wide, Éire Óg tested, but their excellent scoring effort was spoiled by an amazing good save by John Coughlan in the mouth of his goal. Still holding their rival's lines, Éire Óg were through for a seventy which was beaten off by George Garrett, whose support of the Rockies fortunes in the game was distinctly valuable. Peter O'Grady having sent Blackrock up, Jim O'Regan cleared well, but Blackrock returned quickly and pressed an over. Blackrock's next visit was productive of a point from Michael Aherne who was far out and left unmarked. The next challenge was most

exciting and wound up in Blackrock rushing the mid-Cork net. Éire Óg replied from a free in, but Dinny Barry-Murphy's effort was cleared. Some telling work in which Dermot Murphy was seen to advantage, gave his side a footing in the Blackrock territory for an almost certain goal, to be brilliantly cleared by John Coughlan right under the bar. Blackrock broke away from the following exchange and put up a point. A free to each side having been unfruitful, Blackrock were in possession when the full time whistle went.

In addition to the players mentioned in the progress of the game, Denis Coughlan, John Coughlan, Paddy Aherne, John Quirke and Thomas Delea rendered good assistance to the Rockies, while the Murphy's combine, J.O'Sullivan, Horgan, M.Murphy, Forde, Keane, Bernie O'Flynn Leo Brady, Walsh and Jim O'Regan worked exceedingly hard for Éire Óg.
